2.2.1. Marie Hammond, Chief Financial Officer – Budget Overview

Marie Hammond, Chief Financial Officer, provided a Budget Overview from the Ministry announcement in April 2024:

New Funding Model

- GSN funding (operating) has been renamed to Core Education Funding ("Core Ed").
- GSN funding (capital) has been renamed Building, Expanding and Renewing Schools (BERS)
- Priorities and Partnerships Funding (PPF) has been renamed Responsive Education Programs (REP).

Theme – Streamline

18 grants with 77 allocations have been revised into 6 funding pillars:

- Classroom Staffing
- Learning Resources
- Special Education
- School Facilities
- Student Transportation
- School Board Administration

Special Education Fund (SEF)

- Transfer of professional assessment funding into Core Ed Funding
- Components within SEF such as After School Skills Development, Autism Training, and Special Equipment Allocation (SEA) are no longer individually enveloped

Special Equipment Allocation (SEA)

New modernized approach to:

Reduce administrative burden

- Increase flexibility in how it is utilized by boards
- · Better meet the changing needs of students

Comprised of:

- A formula component (base and per-pupil amounts) for any equipment type, technologyrelated or not, and training, maintenance, and repairs related to that equipment for students with special education needs
- A claims-based component for any single item (any equipment type technology related or not) costing \$5,000 or more before taxes for an individual student with special education needs

Special Incidence Portion (SIP)

- SIP funding continues through a table amount (based on previous year funding) the ministry continues to work towards a new approach
- Interim approach to alleviating administrative burden associated with the claims process

Elimination of Covid-19 Related Funding

- The Safe and Clean Schools Supplement, introduced in 2023-24 is being eliminated
- This funding, which provided additional support for salaries and benefits costs of additional professionals and paraprofessionals, EAs, and custodians, was supplemental to existing amounts within the Grants for Student Needs
- Loss of funding of \$247K

Special Education Funding - 2024-2025

- Core Education Funding for 24/25 \$38.6M
- Special Education Needs Transition Navigators Funding \$99,700
- Special Education Additional Qualifications (AQ) Funding \$12,200
- Summer Learning Special Education Supports \$124,500 (This Summer)

Note: Bill 124 has not been included in estimates package for Core Education Funding for 24/25 so these numbers will increase with received estimates in the Fall

Budget Pressures

- Core Education Funding not reflecting inflation/market cost increases
- Benefit Costs/Enhanced Canada Pension Plan (CPP) costs not fully funded
- Supply Costs/Sick Leave Program centrally bargained but underfunded
- Recently negotiated collective agreements and Bill 124 remedy (insufficient employee benefit benchmarks)

Senior Administration continues to apply for additional funding when available, investigates potential revenue opportunities outside Core Ed, continues to look for efficiencies/cost-saving opportunities, and aligns the budget with Strategic Priorities.

2.2.2. Scott Grieve, Superintendent of Facilities – Accessibility Plan 2023-2028

Scott Grieve, Superintendent of Facilities, and Chair of the Accessibility Committee, presented the Multi-Year Accessibility Plan for 2023-2028:

2.5. Staff Reports

2.5.1. Student Services Report – Francesca Mosier, Shelley Phoenix, and Paula Sorhaitz

Francesca Mosier presented the Coordinator's Report:

- The Ministry has provided summer funding to support students with special education needs. A call for proposals was posted and 10 applications were submitted. All 10 programs will run throughout the summer. The programs will be supported by a variety of staff including teachers, EAs, DECEs, CYCs, SLPs, etc. The programs will focus on numeracy & literacy intervention including Lexia, robotics, UFLI, cooking, etc.
- AT Camp will run again this year in first week of July for students in Grade 3-5 who have assistive technology. There will be 20 students attending.
- On June 5, Student Services and Academic Services are providing another training session with teachers focused on Lexia and Universal screeners. Approximately 46 teachers have signed up to attend. The remaining 130 Lexia licenses will be assigned accordingly and will be available for use until August 2025.
- DCART will run a PEERS Summer Camp from July 2-5. Students who have completed the PEERS program were invited to attend. The program will focus on social skills and functional skills.
- The After School Social Skills BBQ is at Windreach Farm on June 17. Families have been invited to attend the free event which includes wagon rides, a petting zoo and a BBQ celebration.
- A new Early Intervention Classroom (EIC) site will open at St. John Bosco C.S. in September 2024. This will be the Board's fourth EIC site.
- 3 applications were submitted for consideration to the Provincial Demonstrations Schools Committee. All 3 students have been offered and accepted their offer and will be attending Sagonaska in September.

Shelley Phoenix presented the Mental Health Report:

- Secondary Student MH Leadership Summit (B Well)
 - Held on May 9th with approximately 5 students from all 8 secondary schools
 - Students collaborated and focused on identifying their group's core values which included: Respect, United Community, Faith, Education and Empowerment
 - From these values they created their mission statement, a slogan and named the group:
 - Empowering a united community built on faith and respect, fostering mental health education and ending stigma.
 - You are not alone; we stand together.
 - R Well
 - Pinewood Centre of Lakeridge Health joined the group for a discussion on substance use, offering some education and began the discussion around addressing substance use at their schools.
 - Students ended the day by planning how they would collect data from their schools



around what students want in terms of mental health promotion.

Coming together in September to review data and plan for the year

Summer 2024

 - Child and Youth Counsellors will be delivering well-being lessons each day
 - Having Youthspeak's youth led interactive presentations at each of the schools' programs
- CYC led Social Skills Group for elementary students: Using the Second Step resource, the group will explore various social skills and practice with the group thorough play
- Piloting Individual Cognitive Behavioural Therapy for students with ASD
- The Social Work Access Line will direct parents and students to community resources during the summer months and resume operation in September
